During the 1930s, the father of Claude M. Scarborough, Jr., lost his dry-cleaning business and then the family home. By the time the family was stable, Claude, Jr., was 12, had moved six times and lived in seven different houses in three different states.

In 1964, he became managing partner of the small law firm that had evicted his family. He made pro-bono service to the poor a core ethic of his firm and rewarded his firm's attorneys based not just on the hours they worked but also on the contributions they made to their community.

For the rest of his life, Scarborough kept the foreclosure papers that had caused his family so much heartache. When he retired in 1995, Nelson Mullins Riley & Scarborough was the largest law firm in all of South Carolina. Today it employs 750 attorneys and legal professionals.
